Keynote Speakers

Professor Sarah Banks

Sarah Banks is Professor in the Department of Sociology and co-founder of the Centre for Social Justice and Community Action at Durham University, UK. The Centre promotes participatory action research for social justice in partnership with community-based organisations. With the Centre and members of International Collaboration for Participatory Health Research (ICPHR), she has developed ethical guidelines for participatory research and offers training/events for academic and community-based researchers. She has coordinated several participatory research projects, including research on debt, poverty and community development, and leads the Ethics Working Group of the ICPHR. She is co-editor of *Ethics in Participatory Research for Health and Social Well-Being* (Routledge, 2019) and co-producing *Research: A Community Development Approach* (Policy Press, 2019), and co-author of *Participatory Research for Health and Social Well-Being* (Springer, 2019).

Dr Jessica Moody

Jessica Moody is a Senior Lecturer in the Department of History at the University of Bristol. Her research considers collective memory, public history, and heritage. She is particularly interested in the representation of, and engagement with, difficult and dissonant pasts especially around histories of enslavement, empire and colonialism, as well as creative forms of memorialisation and counter-memorialisation and the co-production of memory work. Her first monograph, *The Persistence of Memory: Remembering slavery in Liverpool, 'slaving capital of the world'*, analyses how transatlantic slavery has been 'remembered' in Liverpool, the largest slave-trading port in Europe. Jessica is currently a Co-I on the UKRI funded Citizen Science Project 'Citizens Researching Together: Reparative Justice through Collaborative Research' and leads the strand 'Decolonising Memory: digital bodies in movement' with Cleo Lake and Kwesi Johnson.

PhD Careers Panellists

Dr Nic Crossley, Chief Executive Officer at NAS Academy Trust, has over 20 years' experience in education which spans primary, secondary, mainstream and specialist provision and her research interests are in the factors which contribute to educational underachievement. Her Masters in Education and Management, and Masters in Practice-Based Educational Research, also support these interests. She is a council member for ASCL (Association of School and College Leaders) as the national SEND representative, a member of the Ethics, Inclusion and Equalities Committee and Chair of the Women Leader's Network. In September 2021, Nic was made an Honorary Teaching Fellow at the University of Warwick, in recognition of her commitment and contribution to Teacher Education and Research within the Centre for Teacher Education. She is co-author of *Inclusion: A Principled Guide for School Leaders* (Routledge).

Dr Riadh Ghemmour holds a PhD in Education from the University of Exeter. He is currently working at the Royal Central School of Speech and Drama (University of London) as the learning skills international student coordinator. Riadh has been actively involved in many funded projects surrounding issues of anti-racism, de-colonisation and equity within HE. He is also an educational consultant working at the MA Education consultancy (Ltd) offering coaching and training sessions on anti-racism and social justice education. Riadh's major interests include de-colonisation, indigenous methodologies, international student experience, qualitative research and anti-racism. He is undertaking a new and personal project which is about turning his PhD thesis into a book.

Dr Patrick English is an Associate Director in the Political and Social Research team and YouGov's spokesman on political research. He is responsible for methodological and data quality research across YouGov's UK, German and French panels, and specialises in running academic, experimental design, and election-focused projects and outputs. He holds a Doctorate from the University of Manchester and remains active in contributing to academic research and publications.

Dr Nasrul Ismail is a Lecturer in Criminology at the School for Policy Studies, University of Bristol. His research on the impact of austerity on prison health has informed actions of the UN Subcommittee on Prevention of Torture, the World Health Organization, the European Committee for the Prevention of Torture, the House of Commons Justice Committee, and the Nuffield Trust. His research findings have also been referenced by the UK major political parties and have been featured in news outlets such as the Byline Times and The Daily Mirror. He sits on the SWDTP Academic Advisory Board as an early career representative and on the Editorial Board of PLOS One as an Academic Editor.

'Podcast your research'

A 90-minute workshop with Krissy Brighty-Glover

In this session we learn how academics can build podcasting into their impact and engagement plans. Using positive examples of podcasts produced and presented by researchers, this session will cover what makes a 'good' academic/research focused podcast and why. Through interactive exercises and discussion, we will then discover more about the essential practicalities and skills needed to podcast and the things to consider before embarking on your own.

'Get that funding!'

An introduction to writing powerful funding bids with the Research and Development team (RED), University of Bristol

In this session we explore how to write a fantastic funding application! It will include an introduction to key funders and types of schemes available, and the vital ingredients for making powerful and compelling application. Whether you plan a career in academia or other sectors, writing strong applications is an important part of your toolbox, so come and explore the fundamentals here.

'Public engagement – how to do it?'

A workshop with the Public Engagement team, University of Bristol (Ben Meller and Jenny Jopson)

This workshop is focused on the practicalities of public engagement – how to make your research accessible to diverse audiences; how to communicate succinctly and clearly; and what resources there are available to help you become a fantastic communicator of research!



UWE Bristol Frenchay Campus map:




Arriving by car:

Free parking is available at the Enterprise Zone (EP1), you do not need to display a permit when parking there.

NB: There is no vehicle access through North or East Entrances to EP1.

Directions


- Drive past the North entrance to UWE Bristol Frenchay campus. At the roundabout (MOD exit), move into the **middle** lane as you turn left.
- At the next roundabout, take the 2nd exit.
- At the next roundabout, take the 1st exit.
- At the barrier, access will be given to conference attendees.
- Keep left/downhill until you reach the car park at the front of EP1 on your right.
- Please park on the right-hand side of the car park.



Walking from SU building on Frenchay campus:

- Face the SU shop. Walk to the left-hand side of the building.
- Walk down the steps and turn left.
- Head towards Future Space and walk to the left of the building (past the parked bus).
- Enter the walkway door ahead of you, bear left and exit the walkway on the opposite side.
- Walk towards the rear of EP1 and bear left around the building until you reach the front entrance.



Arriving by bus:

First Bus and Travelwest provide bus services to Frenchay campus.

Current First Bus services to Frenchay Campus include: 19, 48A, 70, 74, 72, m1, m3.

Megabus and National Express also provide direct services to Frenchay Campus from many UK cities.

Arriving by train:

The closest train stations are **Filton Abbey Wood** (20 min walk) and **Bristol Parkway** (30 min walk).

If you are arriving from **Bristol Temple Meads**, buses are available from the station to UWE Frenchay campus. Then please follow the directions for walking from the SU on campus to EP1 (see campus maps above).
